KDH staff member turns her hobby into a humanitarian project, providing comfort to palliative patients a world away

In today's fast-paced world, juggling work and family responsibilities, it can be difficult to find a few moments to pursue a hobby.

At KDH, we have a staff member who not only makes time for her hobby, but has also turned it into a humanitarian project.

Leanne Widenmaier, one of our valued Personal Care Assistants, crochets sleeping mats from plastic milk bags for people less fortunate than ourselves.

A longtime knitter and crocheter, Leanne learned several years ago that plastic milk bags could be crocheted into sleeping mats for refugees and other people in need. When she saw one of the other moms at a sports tournament making one of these mats, Leanne asked her to teach her how.

Before long she was 'hooked', and taking her crochet supplies with her to all of her son's sporting events, to school meetings, to bed with her at night, and more.

Leanne's husband even bought her a miner's headlamp so that she could crochet in the car at night while traveling to and from her son's bowling tournaments.

About six years later, Leanne has crocheted more than 30 sleeping mats, with the help of a friend. The mats are in two sizes: an adults' mat about 6' by 3', and a child-sized mat 4' by 3'.

Each mat takes about 30 hours to create and is made up of 250 or so milk bags, each one carefully cut into one long strip and then wound into a ball like yarn before it is crocheted. The finished mats are lightweight but surprisingly cushioning, as well as easy to clean and colourful.

Once she had a good collection of sleeping mats made, Leanne started to look around for a charitable organization that would put them to good use. She hoped that the mats she had so painstakingly created would make a difference in the lives of people who would otherwise be sleeping on the floor.

Finding a good match proved to be difficult, however, until re-

cently. In early November, 2015, we found a humanitarian organization that is a perfect fit for Leanne's mats: the Kenya Hospices and Palliative Care Association (KEHPCA).

Headquartered in Nairobi, KEHPCA's activities include education and training of health care professionals and non-professionals, research for palliative

care in Kenya, technical support for palliative care service providers, advocacy, and fundraising.

KEHPCA is led by Execu-

tive Director Dr. Zipporah Ali, who was in Ottawa in early November to make a presentation at the Canadian Hospice Palliative Care Association's annual conference.

Dr. Ali is a palliative care doctor who has received international recognition for her work, including the African Palliative Care Association Award for her contribution to palliative care in Africa, and an Honorary Doctorate from Oxford Brookes University.

She took time out of her busy schedule while in Ottawa to meet with Leanne, and was pleased to accept Leanne's mats on behalf of KEHPCA for distribution to palliative patients served by her organization. She noted that these patients are often thin and frail, and rest on reeds on the floor or on the bare ground. Leanne was overjoyed to hear that her mats would get palliative patients off the floor and provide comfort.

Dr. Ali took several of the sleeping mats back with her to Kenya; we are in the process of figuring out how to get the rest of the mats to KEHPCA.

Leanne recently received a photo from Dr. Ali of a Nairobi Hospice patient who was very happy to receive one of the

mats when he went for day care at the hospice. Fred Ikutwa (pictured on our front cover) is a 42 year old father of four who has Kaposi Sarcoma and HIV. He lives with his family in the Kibera slums of Nairobi.

Dr. Ali reports that the hospice nurses said the sleeping mats will be very useful for their patients and they are looking forward to the arrival of the next shipment.

Meanwhile, Leanne is hard at work making more!

KDH introduces a safer way of dispensing medications

n November 17, 2015, we went live with a new, safer system for storing and distributing patient medications. Automated dispensing cabinets (ADCs) have become the gold standard for storing and distributing medications in Canadian teaching hospitals and in many of the larger community hospitals. They were deemed prohibitive for small rural hospitals like KDH because of cost and limited staffing resources for implementation.

These barriers were removed several years ago when the Champlain Local Health Integration Network (LHIN) launched a regional Pharmacy initiative for the eight small rural hospitals

in its jurisdiction. As a result of this initiative, funds were made available to these hospitals to introduce automated dispensing cabinets.

The cabinets, which provide a safer way of dispensing medications – think of them as ATMs for drugs – are now in use in the KDH Emergency Department and on our medical and surgical inpatient units. "Although it took a lot of effort to get up and running with the new system, they recognized that it would enable us to provide better and safer care for our patients."

The ADCs allow medications to be stored and dispensed near the point of care, while controlling and tracking drug distribution. Further, by restricting individual drugs – such as high-risk medications and controlled substances – to unique drawers within the cabinet, overall inventory management, patient safety, and medication security are enhanced.

The introduction of the ADCs involved many people working behind the scenes for many months. As KDH's Charge Pharmacist, Mary Whyte, explained, "The implementation of automated dispensing cabinets was a significant achievement for a small hospital like KDH. It was only possible because of the commitment and dedication of our Nursing, Pharmacy and IT teams."

Cindy Kerkhof, a Pharmacy Technician at KDH, deserves special mention. Although she is only at the hospital on a part-time basis, Cindy took the lead in setting up the dispensing cabinets and testing a multitude of scenarios. She was supported by our IT staff: Tim Farncombe, IS/IT Manager; and Dave Salmon, IT Support/Customer Support Specialist.

After the set-up and testing were complete, Cindy passed on the intricacies of the cabinets to RNs Michelle Morgan and Wendy Aleman, who trained the remainder of KDH's nursing staff.

"Our nurses have embraced the new technology," reported Cathy Burke, Vice President of Nursing/Clinical Services. "Although it took a lot of effort to get up and running with the new system, they recognized that it would enable us to provide better and safer care for our patients."

The Patient Experience:

This is the story of Graham Gould's experience as a participant in the Parkinson's Support Group at KDH. A regular at the group for about a year and a half, Graham wanted to share his experience in Health Matters, thinking that some of our readers might be able to benefit from the group as well.

Graham Gould It started when Graham saw an ad in the paper for the hospital's Parkinson's

Support Group. He called up and had his name added to the waiting list: the group is kept small - about 10 participants - so that each can get individualized attention. After a few months he was invited to the hospital to meet with Tanya Collins, KDH's Staff Physiotherapist, and other members of our Rehab team, to determine whether the program would be of benefit to him.

Parkinson's is a neurogenerative disease that affects the body's movement. The most common symptoms are tremor, slowness and stiffness, impaired balance and rigidity of muscles. Exercise is one important way that people with Parkinson's can manage their symptoms. It helps muscles and joints and improves overall health and wellbeing.

The KDH Rehab team assessed Graham and determined he was a good fit for the group. Graham was impressed by the skills and knowledge of the Rehab team. "I could tell right away that I was dealing with professionals," he said.

The KDH Parkinson's Support Group meets for a weekly exercise class that focuses on strengthening and balance exercises. It's a place where the members of the group feel supported and safe. "Tanya

doesn't miss a thing!" said Graham. "If someone's balance is failing or they're getting dizzy, she's right there, making sure we are ok."

He added that all the members of the Rehab team are very approachable: "They answer questions and offer solutions," he explained. "As well,' he added, "it means a lot that I can call Tanya

any time during the week if I have a question."

Graham reports that the weekly exercises have improved both his strength and balance. In addition, Tanya and her team have encouraged him to be more diligent about doing his exercises at home. That helps too.

According to Graham, another great benefit of the Parkinson's Support Group is the opportunity it has given him to make new friends with people who know what it's like to live with Parkinson's. "I've formed some very close friendships," he said. "We get together outside of the group; we get along very well."

The exercise class starts at 1:00 pm each Thursday, but most of the participants get there about 12:30, Graham explained, "to have a good chin wag" before it starts.

Graham was diagnosed with Parkinson's about two years ago. "It is very tough to find out you have Parkinson's," he said. "It's a time when connecting with other people with Parkinson's could make a big difference."

Graham also has diabetes, and has been a regular participant in

KDH recognized with a Silver Seal for environmental performance

n late October, 2015, KDH's efforts to improve our environmental performance were rewarded with a Silver Seal in the Ontario Hospital Association (OHA)'s Green Hospital Scorecard program.

KDH was one of only 31 hospitals in the province to be awarded a Silver Seal; just two hospitals reached Gold, the highest level.

The Green Hospital Scorecard shows our environmental performance in five areas: energy, waste, water, pollution prevention, and corporate leadership, planning and management. It provides a snapshot of our energy and water use, waste generation, recycling rate, and more. The Scorecard also measures corporate commitment to environmental sustainability, and progress in environmental planning and target-setting. It highlights areas where we have been successful, and where further improvements may be possible.

The Green Hospital Scorecard enables us to benchmark our own year-over-year performance as well as do comparative benchmarking against the performance of our peer hospitals.

The 2015 Green Hospital Scorecard awards were based on environmental performance data for 2014. As an example of environmental sustainability efforts at KDH in 2014, we were able to divert the following from landfill:

- · Biomedical waste 8929 kg
- Shredded Paper 2972 kg
- Scrap Metal 2750 kg
- · Pallets 1800 kg
- · Toners 180 kg
- · Batteries 66 kg



As part of the refresh of our Strategic Plan earlier in 2015, we had committed to the goal of attaining Silver Status by the end of 2016 - thanks to the efforts of our dedicated staff, we achieved our goal a full year ahead of schedule!

When the 2016 awards are handed out this fall, we expect a higher score as a result of a number of changes we made in 2015. For example, when patient rooms in our

1960s era wing were updated in the spring, we substituted energy saving LED lighting for outmoded fluorescent lights, and replaced aging air conditioners with new units operating on efficient thermostats. We also installed a new low-flow macerator (a machine that cleans bed pans) that uses compostable materials.

In additon, we installed energy efficient LED lighting in the parking lot in the fall of 2015 and placed occupancy sensors in the administrative offices so that the lights only go on when someone enters the room. We also replaced older toilets in the original wing's public washrooms with low-flow toilets.

KDH CEO Frank Vassallo commended the hospital's 'Green Team', led by Building Services Manager Tammy Buehlow, on the achievement of the Silver Seal. "Congratulations not only on reaching this substantial milestone," he said, "but also on doing so a year ahead of schedule - your leadership propelled KDH to this accelerated accomplishment."

KDH enjoys ongoing support from a generous community whose gifts of money and time make a difference at the hospital every day. In 2015 alone, more than \$300,000 was donated to the KDH Equipment Fund thanks to the community's support of the KDH Foundation!

The medical equipment purchased with these funds includes a specialized electric bed, specialized chair, a gastroscope, colonoscope, HeartStart monitor and defibrillator. Much of this type of equipment needs to be updated and replaced on an ongoing basis.

The Foundation will be affixing labels to the equipment it has purchased for the Hospital over the years, to show where donor funds have been used.

"It will be interesting when we go back historically and label equipment to see how much the community has donated to the hospital," said Joanne. "By working together, our community has been able to create a great hospital."

On the 2016 list of needed equipment is another specialized patient bed, an electrocardiogram (ECG) machine, a cardiac

Whether it was leading the charge in raising money for the Hospital, as he did for the Lean on Me program that raised \$5M for KDH about six years ago, or training a new real estate salesperson, helping an individual or a family in need, or answering a call for clothing for children who needed winter jackets, Harry was always the go-to-guy. He not only answered the call, he would answer ALL the calls whatever the need. He was truly an inspiration.

Harry inspired me to give back of both my money and my time. That is why I got involved with the Kemptville District Hospital Foundation -I wanted to make a difference for the community, and Harry inspired me to do just that. Harry always loved getting involved and helping out when it was most needed -I saw that two of his favorite activities, outside of his family, were socializing and helping others.

Today, I am the Chair of the Kemptville District Hospital Foundation and helping the Hospital. Along with a team of very likeminded individuals, I am looking to help KDH with the renewal and revitalization of the Hospital.

Thanks to the Pratt family, who asked that donations in Harry's memory be directed to the Foundation, we have received close to \$35,000 in memorial donations, with an expectation to raise significantly more through third party events in Harry's honour over the next months. The family has requested that the funds raised be used to purchase a specialized bed for the Inpatient Unit and a piece of equipment for the Emergency Department.

The Chamber of Commerce is holding a BBQ at the Tallman Truck Centre on June 30th with funds raised to be donated to the KDH Foundation in honour of Harry.

The Foundation is currently in discussion with the Pratt family with regard to how they would like us to recognize Harry and his tremendous contributions to the Hospital.

Renewal of KDH's Heart of Giving Memorial Garden

The Heart of Giving Memorial Garden at Kemptville District Hospital was established in 2003 to provide the community with a permanent space to recognize loved ones.

In the summer of 2015, the Garden experienced a renewal: the space was transformed to reflect the generosity of our donors and community members in memory of their loved ones.

Then in December of 2015, as part of the Foundation's annual Tree of Lights event, a ceremony was held to recognize the loved ones already memorialized with stones and to add five new stones to the garden. A large gathering of family and friends remembered and celebrated the lives of their loved ones. This event was sponsored by Hydro One, MacEwen Fuels, Urbandale Homes, and Hulse, Playfair & McGarry.

There has been great interest in the garden since it was refurbished and another dedication ceremony will be held soon to add the new stones that were purchased over the winter months.

There are many options for recognizing a loved one with a stone in the garden. The perimeter of the heart is surrounded by large marble slabs, which can be purchased for \$2,000 each. The granite stones within the heart can be purchased for \$1,000. There is also the option of purchasing a quarter of a marble slab for \$500.

Next year the garden will be expanded to include benches; name plates for these will be available for \$100 each.

All proceeds from the Heart of Giving Memorial Garden are used to purchase vital medical and diagnostic equipment not funded by the Province or any other sources.

Patient and Family Centred Care at KDH

Patient and Family Centred Care is a philosophy that is transforming healthcare: it shifts healthcare providers from doing something for or to a patient to partnering with the patient, both in his or her care and in the design, delivery, and improvement of health services. This spring, KDH launched an innovative campaign to help transition from providing the patient-focused care we are known for to partnering with patients for Patient and Family Centred Care.

Dubbed "The Patient Experience Starts Here", the campaign was designed to encourage all KDH staff, physicians, and volunteers to internalize the principle that each one of us makes a vital contribution to the patient experience. You may have noticed the "The Patient Experience Starts Here" buttons we are wearing, and the posters of a variety of staff, physicians and volunteers performing their individual roles in the hospital.

The benefits of Patient and Family Centred Care are increased quality of care, enhanced patient safety, and higher satisfaction, among both patients and staff.

In addition to providing these benefits, Patient and Family Centred Care is now mandated by the provincial government and our federal accreditation body: for 2016 surveys, Accreditation Canada has added more than 350 new criteria that set out best practices for the delivery of Patient and Family Centred Care.

"The delivery of Patient and Family Centred Care in its fullest form results in an exceptional experience for every patient," said Frank, "and everybody who works, volunteers, or provides services here has the opportunity and responsibility to make Patient and Family Centred Care a reality at KDH."

Your Hospital – Your Healthy Future

In January 2016, KDH began the process of developing its next strategic plan, for 2016 to 2019. Called, Your Hospital – Your Healthy Future, the process was designed to encourage stakeholders to engage with the hospital like never before – to share their ideas about KDH's strengths, potential opportunities, and desired results for programs, services, and more.

During the last week of March 2016, the project team, led by Catherine Van Vliet, Executive VP Integration & Primary Health, held separate consultation sessions with the public, partners, internal stakeholders (staff, physicians and volunteers), and past KDH Board Chairs. As well, for one of KDH's largest user groups, children and youth, interviews were conducted with elementary and secondary principals and superintendents, and mental health and addictions leaders.

People who weren't able to participate in person were invited to take an online survey, provide their input through a postage paid response card, or contact a member of the KDH strategic planning team personally.

All of the feedback received was compiled and analyzed, along with an environmental scan that focused on the changing demographics in our area, trends impacting health services, and Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-term Care priorities.

KDH's Board of Directors and senior management team are currently using this information to draft the new strategic plan. It will be completed in time for the hospital's Annual General Meeting in June and shared publicly at that time.

Our Road to Exemplary

As you know, KDH was awarded Exemplary standing on our last Accreditation Canada survey in the fall of 2012. Our next Accreditation is fast approaching – the Accreditation Canada surveyors will be onsite in November 2016, assessing how well we are meeting their 1300-plus criteria pertaining to the quality and safety of patient care.

We welcome the opportunity to measure our programs and services against best practices, demonstrating our commitment to a continuous process of improvement. The process helps us identify what we do well, where we can make improvements, and how to make them happen.

Our Accreditation Team, led by Lana LeClair, VP Corporate Affairs, is hard at work identifying any areas where we may need to make changes to processes or procedures to meet new Accreditation Canada standards, and then implementing action plans to close the gaps. A major focus of the new Accreditation requirements is enhanced Patient and Family Centred Care (mentioned above).



This colourful roadmap, which hangs in our main lobby, is designed as a fun way to chart our progress through the work we need to do in preparation for Accreditation this fall.

KDH earns award for making the healthy food choice the easy choice

ongratulations to our Dietary Department and the KDH Auxiliary on achieving Bronze status in the Healthy Foods in Champlain Hospitals initiative!

Spearheaded by the Champlain Cardiovascular Disease Prevention Network, the initiative sees hospitals across our region making healthier food available in their cafeterias, gift shops, vending machines and franchise operations.

The aim of the program is to reduce rates of chronic illness such as heart disease, stroke and cancer by creating an environment where the healthy food choice is the easy choice.

KDH was the seventh hospital (out of 23) in the Champlain Local Health Integration Network (LHIN) to achieve Bronze status to date - none have yet achieved Silver or the top level, Gold.

We were able to achieve Bronze status in a relatively short time, as the hospital's food offerings already met many of the criteria. Andrea Corbett, KDH's Manager of Dietary Services, explained: "KDH was always a step ahead in providing healthier foods to our staff, visitors and patients - about eight years ago we decommissioned our deep fryer, and five years ago we stopped selling chocolate bars, chips and pop."

For KDH, achieving Bronze status meant increasing the availability of whole grains, vegetables and fruit, reducing sodium in soups, decreasing the portion sizes of high-calorie beverages, and creating nutritional labels for all coffee bar and vending machine items made onsite.

Andrea and the Dietary team

worked closely with the KDH Auxiliary, who operate the hospital's popular coffee bar, to make the necessary changes.

Volunteer Brenda Steacy, the coffee bar's food manager, expressed her thanks to staff, physicians and volunteers for being open to the changes.

"I think the most noticeable difference for us has been that we've replaced our former soups with lower sodium, lower fat versions," she said. "I know some of our regulars preferred the original recipes, and we are grateful for their patience as we've worked to find soups that are flavorful as well as healthy."

To meet the Bronze status criteria, all KDH soups had to contain 480 milligrams or less of sodium, and 10 grams or less of fat. One of the first soups to be revised was the original cream of broccoli and cheese soup, which had a whopping 1,010 milligrams of sodium and 17 grams of fat! After some research on Andrea's part, it was replaced with a healthier version containing a mere 470 milligrams of sodium and 2 grams of fat.

Nutritional information was added to the labels on the coffee bar's sandwiches, yogurt parfaits and muffins, and a binder containing ingredients lists as well as nutritional information was made available at the coffee bar.

Two representatives of the Healthy Foods initiative were on hand November 5, 2015 when the hospital held a celebration to mark the achievement. Laurie

the KDH Diabetes Education and Support program for several years. He says it has been very helpful in managing his condition. Led by Heather Kamenz, Diabetes Nurse Educator, and Julia Hicks, Diabetes Dietitian Educator, the program offers a full range of diabetes education and support services.

Graham credits the program with helping him get down to a healthy weight. "After starting to meet with Heather and Julia, I realized I couldn't fool around with my diabetes - I had to keep focused," he said.

Having started with one-onone counselling, Graham joined the Diabetes Exercise Group. He finds that group very helpful as well and notes that, again, the participants are a closeknit group. Graham is happy to report that he is able to keep his diabetes under control by following a healthy diet and exercising.

Graham has high praise for Julia and Heather, and in fact all KDH staff he's come in contact with. "The hospital's staffing choices are spectacular," he said. "I don't know how they are able to hire so many great people."

KDH pilots IT project that improves the patient experience

When a patient comes to the Emergency Department or is admitted to the hospital, care providers need vital information, including what care that patient may be receiving at home. A new collaboration between KDH and the Champlain Community Care Access Centre (CCAC) is making that possible.

KDH is excited to be the pilot site for the CCAC's new eNotification system. With this integrated information technology project, admission information is now automatically shared between the KDH information system and the CCAC database.

This means that the CCAC is notified when a patient is admitted to the KDH Emergency Department. The hospital then receives notification if the patient is currently receiving home care services from the CCAC. Finally, notification is sent to the CCAC when a patient is discharged, to ensure follow-up and the resumption of services.

The new process has proven to be very beneficial, as ER physicians are able to make care decisions with more information at hand. This information is particularly helpful in an emergency situation and helps to inform the care plan moving forward.

"It's been a great success so far," said Tim Farncombe, KDH's IS/IT Manager. "The next step is to enable family doctors to access the information as well. Coordinated care between the hospital, the CCAC, and the patient's physician may help to reduce repeat visits to the ER and other health issues."

This initiative is one of several IT integration projects led by the Champlain Alliance of Small Hospitals (CAsH).

KDH is going smoke-free

In January, new provincial legislation made it illegal to smoke on the outdoor grounds of a hospital other than in a designated smoking area. This includes vehicles parked on hospital grounds.

KDH responded to the new legislation by creating a designated smoking area in the northwest corner of the ER parking lot. Patient safety and accessibility were our top priorities when choosing this location, and we are grateful for patient input into the decision.

This designated smoking area is temporary, however, as we are required to phase it out by January 1, 2018 at the latest, when smoking on hospital property will be entirely banned in the province.

KDH stresses the importance of hand hygiene in preventing illness

Although cold and flu season is over, hand washing is still the most effective way to prevent infections and illnesses.

Hand washing stations dispensing alcohol based hand rub are provided throughout the hospital for use by staff and visitors alike.

Alcohol based hand rub is provided as it kills 99.9 percent of the germs that can be found on your hands.

Visitors are asked to keep themselves and others safe by using the hand wash provided, not visiting if they are unwell, and refraining from having contact with other patients.

KDH's doctors, nurses and other healthcare providers are expected to wash their hands before and after contact with patients, as well as after exposure to body fluids.

Like all hospitals in Ontario, we audit and report all healthcare providers' compliance with the hand hygiene guidelines. At KDH, this is the responsibility of Annie Lord-Stephens, our Infection Prevention Control Practitioner.

Annie notes that it's ok to ask your nurse or doctor if they've washed their hands. However, since many people would be uncomfortable asking their health care providers if they've cleaned their hands, KDH puts the onus on the providers.

"We provide ongoing hand hygiene education activities for our health care providers," Annie explained. "Our goal is to ensure that performing proper hand hygiene remains a central and consistent part of everyday practice."
