Elizabeth has challenged the KDH family to follow suit as they are able to. With the tremendous support KDH enjoys throughout the communities we serve, I am confident that together we can make CT a reality!

CEO's Message

am very pleased to introduce this new issue of Health Matters. In the Spring 2022 issue I shared that we had begun the important work of bringing a CT scanner to KDH. I am extremely proud to state that as an organization we have made huge strides in this work. We have received official designation from the Province as a CT site, secured funding from the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville and the Municipality of North Grenville (\$900,000 each) to build the required addition to house the CT scanner, along with \$200,000 that was set aside from the hospital budget, and now our Foundation has launched a capital campaign to raise the \$2.2 Million required to purchase the CT scanner itself.

For those doing the math, the total cost to bring a CT scanner to KDH is \$4.2 Million. While this seems a staggering amount for a small hospital to raise, I have no doubt it can be done, thanks to you – the people in the communities that KDH is privileged to serve.

A number of articles in this issue of Health Matters explain the vital importance of bringing CT technology to KDH; for example, the conversation with our Chief of Staff, Dr. Colin Sentongo, on page 4, and local paramedic Christ Scott's perspective on page 13.

I also want to highlight our collaboration with The Ottawa Hospital (TOH) for emergency services (see page 6). Through this expansion of our longstanding strategic partnership, our two hospitals are planning to implement an integrated service delivery model for the Emergency Department. Stay tuned for more information in the months ahead.

I would also draw your attention to the article on page 16 about the great work of WAY – Wellness Access for Youth – a vital initiative KDH helped get off the ground a number of years ago after community input identified a need for more mental health and substance use health services for youth in our area.

Why KDH Needs a CT Scanner, Now!

A conversation with Dr. Colin Sentongo, KDH's Chief of Staff

The KDH Foundation is currently fundraising for a CT scanner. In a conversation with the Foundation, Dr. Colin Sentongo, Chief of Staff, described the CT scanner as "the gold standard requirement to operate a modern ER." Not only do our complex patients require it, but physicians expect to have it as part of their toolbox, he explained.

"We are always competing for the limited supply of ER physicians, and the CT will improve this physician recruitment as it is an expectation for a hospital with our demographics and patient volumes to have one," said Dr. Sentongo. He explained that it is so much easier for a physician to have a CT scanner available onsite and not have to convince a physician over the phone at a tertiary (highly specialized) care centre that a patient needs one, and meets the threshold for transfer. "For the patient, a CT scan can provide early diagnosis, which means early management or planning of management of the particular health issue."

Dr. Sentongo recognized that we cannot continue to burden other health centres with our requests to use their CT scanners. Some of our partner referral institutions are actually incredulous that we do not have our own, and sometimes resent receiving transfers that overburden their ERs that are already running over capacity.

There are also other practical concerns. "Without a CT scanner at KDH, both our patients and their families are impacted," said Dr. Sentongo. "Consider this: after waiting through triage at KDH, a patient who requires a CT scan is sent by ambulance to an Ottawa hospital. This means one of our nursing staff must ride with the patient, which makes us short-staffed. The ambulance cannot wait around and returns to base or has to attend to another emergency. The patient must therefore make his or her way back to Kemptville under their own recognizance when they are finished with their CT if it is normal." He shared another scenario: "If a patient is given an appointment for CT, a family member or friend might have to take time off work to transport their loved one 100 km or more, round trip, outside of our area."

In addition to reducing the travel to other locations for a CT scan, Dr. Sentongo said that having CT at KDH will be very helpful for our inpatient unit. He explained that, "Lots of times a patient, for example, needs surveillance of their cancer. Travelling to Ottawa at a fragile point in their life adds an unnecessary burden. We need the technology at home, in Kemptville."

Dr. Sentongo also addressed the steady growth of the Kemptville community, with residential projects and nursing homes sprouting up constantly. "With our changing demographics and population growth, we need to be prepared. "We need to operate our ER like a city one. The reality is that Kemptville will soon be considered a suburb of Ottawa. We need to prepare ourselves for more growth. Having a CT scanner is an essential part of this planning."

Patient Letter

Last summer while working in the garden of a friend, I tripped over a pile of plastic piping and landed face down on the rusty rail of a trailer parked in the yard. I am not sure that I was rendered unconscious by the fall, but I think it likely. I was stunned and had a closeup vision of a mouse or vole inches from my face. Not sure if that



was real or not. In any case, when I was able to struggle to my feet, feeling somewhat groggy and dizzy, I realized I was bleeding from the scalp. Now, as every nurse knows, bleeding from the scalp is quite profuse, so I had blood all over my face and hair. When I had staggered up to my friend's house, she helped stem the tide of blood and pressed me to go to the hospital. I was reluctant to go once it appeared the blood had stopped flowing (although it never really did), and insisted on driving home. Once there, cooler heads prevailed and I made my way to the emergency department.

I waited patiently in the KDH ER with a towel on my head, waiting to be seen by a doctor. I was triaged in due course, and got to see a doctor about four hours later. She examined the wound and stitched me up, but made it clear that my head should be scanned to check that there was no internal damage. I expected another wait of a few hours until the scan could be arranged at KDH, but she informed me that the nearest CT scanner was at the Civic Campus of The Ottawa Hospital. She would send me there by ambulance.

So, it was off to Ottawa in an ambulance. The next delay was at the receiving corridor outside the ER at the Civic. Two extremely pleasant women paramedics who had brought me from Kemptville looked after me well and chatted as we waited for the hospital staff to admit me. Another two hours. Then it was upstairs to the diagnostic department where I was wheeled into a cubicle for a wait of six hours until I could have the scan. By this time, it was close to midnight and they had not even looked at the scan. I dozed for a while and, close to 6:30 am, they informed me that they could detect no further damage to my skull or brain. Now I began to be concerned about how I would get home. They told me, quite firmly but politely, that I was on my own. They could make no arrangements for transport. So, I called my poor husband, at home, asleep, and asked him to come and fetch me. He arrived at about 7:30 am and we were home by 8:15 am.

All told, my tumble resulted in almost 16 hours of seeking and receiving medical attention. If KDH had had a CT scanner, this could have been more like eight hours or less. Nevertheless, I was well and promptly treated at KDH with the resources they have and am most grateful to the staff that saw me. I am glad they are just down the street but believe more resources, such as a CT scanner, should be devoted to making their job more efficient.

The Ottawa Hospital and Kemptville District Hospital Collaborate for Emergency Care

n late May 2023, The Ottawa Hospital (TOH) and Kemptville District Hospital (KDH) announced a new collaboration for emergency care.

Together, the two hospitals are planning to implement an integrated service delivery model for the KDH Emergency Department in the coming months. This model will ensure that patients accessing the KDH Emergency Department will have seamless and consistent care for the future.

In June 2023 TOH's Emergency Physician group began working with the KDH Emergency Department to coordinate and help support emergency services in Kemptville over the summer months.

Emergency Physicians from TOH working in the KDH ER report that they appreciate the professionalism and collegiality of the entire KDH Emergency Team, which includes physicians, nurses, diagnostic imaging and lab staff, and others. They've also commented on the excellence of the facility itself.

The exception that a number of TOH physicians have noted is the lack of CT scanning technology at KDH. TOH physicians are accustomed to having this important diagnostic

tool at their fingertips. Currently at KDH, patients requiring CT have to be transported to another area hospital for this test.

"Having all of the tools that you need to provide patient care in one place is an essential part of any health care worker's job," said Dr. Guy Hébert, Medical Director for the Department of Emergency Medicine at The Ottawa Hospital. "It ensures that we are able to provide the best care possible in a timely manner, with the most accurate information on the patient's condition, all in the same facility. Patients are able to receive the tests they need without travelling to another location, which creates a better overall patient experience."

"A CT scan is now considered the 'gold standard' in Emergency medical care, added KDH's Chief of Staff, Dr. Colin Sentongo. "With Kemptville's changing demographics, and our Emergency Department facing a greater complexity of patients, getting the CT scanner is the hospital's utmost priority. It will be a 'game changer' in terms of our ability to diagnose patients more quickly and consequently manage their conditions faster. It will also decrease the impact on both patients and their families in having to endure a prolonged transfer to a tertiary care centre to obtain a CT."

Prior to the establishment of this new partnership, like a number of other hospitals across Canada, KDH had been dealing with the possibility of some reduction in emergency services due to the shortage of physicians working in rural emergency departments.

"We are so grateful to be able to collaborate and leverage our strategic partnership with The Ottawa Hospital," said Frank Vassallo, KDH's CEO. 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"Our hospitals have worked together for many years, collaborating on ways to improve access to care for patients throughout our region," added Cameron Love, President and CEO of The Ottawa Hospital. "This partnership is another step in that approach, as we look at more ways to ensure patients receive the care they need."

TOH and KDH previously created an innovative partnership in orthopedic surgery in 2017, which saw surgeons from both hospitals perform joint replacement procedures in KDH's state-ofthe-art operating facilities. This helped to reduce wait times for patients throughout the region, and allowed many patients to receive care closer to home.

More information about the integrated service delivery model currently under development by TOH and KDH will be shared as it becomes available.

More About CT Scans

Medical professionals use computed tomography, also known as CT, to examine structures inside the body. A CT scan uses X-rays and computers to produce images of a cross-section of the body. It takes pictures that show very thin "slices" of the patient's bones, muscles, organs, and blood vessels so that healthcare providers can see the body in great detail.

Conditions that a CT scan can find include:

- certain types of cancer and benign tumors;
- fractures;
- blood clots;
- bowel disorders (blockages, Crohn's disease);
- brain and spinal cord diseases or injuries;
- internal bleeding.

Why a CT Scanner is Critical for KDH: A Paramedic's Perspective

Life as a paramedic is never dull," explains Chris Scott, Paramedics Supervisor for the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville who lives in the area served by KDH.

He explained that a large portion of the patients sent by ambulance from KDH to larger centres are sent to get a diagnostic CT scan. "Working as a paramedic, some days I would spend an entire day with one KDH emergency room patient, waiting around for them to undergo a CT scan in Ottawa," said Chris, "And since our patient was stable, we'd end up waiting in the line-up while high acuity patients went ahead of us. Sometimes that was the only patient we would help in an entire 12-hour shift."

With only two ambulances allocated for the entire catchment area of North Grenville, that meant there was only one ambulance available to support local residents.

That's why Chris Scott is a strong advocate for bringing a CT scanner to KDH sooner rather than later. "A CT scanner has become a fundamental piece of equipment required for an emergency department," said Chris. Working as a paramedic in the region, Chris knew that many of the patients he would bring to KDH following a 911 call would need to be sent to other hospitals for CT scans. Unfortunately there are only very specific situations where paramedics can bypass a smaller hospital, and the need for diagnostic imaging is not one of them. Chris would take patients to KDH knowing it wasn't where they needed to be and the services weren't going to meet the patient's needs.

Not only is the process of transferring patients into the city inefficient, it's also incredibly uncomfortable for the patient. "Ambulances were not built for comfort. And you're not going to feel any better by being strapped to a stretcher for hours on end, waiting in line for your turn," said Chris.

For Chris, getting a CT scanner in Kemptville is

a crossroads moment for the hospital. "I've spent my career in the medical

profession. Getting a CT scanner in Kemptville could be a pillar from which to grow the hospital so it can continue to serve the community," explains Chris. "North Grenville and the surrounding areas are growing rapidly. The need for a CT scanner has existed for years and that need will only continue to grow as our community grows."

Chris hopes that families and donors will be generous when making their gift towards keeping patients close to home. "It's not just good business sense," explains Chris. "It's good for the community, and it's good for my family and friends – that's what matters most."

Foundation Receives \$21,000 from International Plowing Match for CT Scanner Campaign

On July 24, 2023, the profits from the 2022 International Plowing Match (IPM) & Rural Expo, held in September 2022 at the Kemptville Campus, were distributed to 40 charitable organizations throughout Leeds and Grenville.

The KDH Foundation received a cheque for \$21,000 from the 2022 IPM Board of Directors.

A total of \$165,000 was distributed to hospitals, community youth groups, community support organizations, IPM partners, and food banks.

Foundation Provides \$250,000 in Funding for New Anesthesia Ventilators to Improve the OR Experience for Patients and Providers

n July 2023, KDH received three new anesthesia ventilators funded by the KDH Foundation.

"Anesthesia ventilators are essentially the machinery that keeps the patient alive during surgery," explained Dr. Colin Sentongo, who served KDH as Chief of Anaesthesiology for six years before being appointed Chief of Staff in 2021.

"They breathe for the patient; they administer the gases that keep the patient asleep," he added. "So I am biased in the sense that I think it's probably the most important equipment that you can have in an operating room. Everything else, in my opinion, is secondary."

The new ventilators are an upgrade from KDH's previous anesthesia machines, which Dr. Sentongo described as outdated. "Extra perks" of the new ventilators, according to Tanya Deans, RN, KDH's Manager of Clinical Programs, are "less anesthetic gas usage with more precise delivery and new monitoring cables for patients needing paralytics (powerful muscle relaxants used to prevent muscle movement) during their procedures." In addition, the new ventilators are familiar to many of the Anaesthesiologists who provide services at KDH as they also use them in The Ottawa Hospital (TOH) ORs.

The KDH Foundation provided \$250,000 for the purchase of the new Ventilators; these funds were raised in the tremendously

Outpatient Programs & Specialist Clinics

KDH offers a variety of specialists' clinics and outpatient programs. A physician referral is needed unless otherwise indicated.

Chronic Pain | Dr. Zeeya Jamal offers a clinic in managing chronic pain. Dr. Jamal's practice at KDH focuses on patients suffering with headaches, facial pain, neck pain and low back pain. Among the services offered are nerve blocks of the head, face, neck and spine.

Cardiology | Our cardiology clinic provides assessment and management of chest pain (including referrals for exercise stress testing), atrial and ventricular arrhythmias, congestive heart failure, etc.

Dermatology | Treatment of skin problems and diseases, from rashes, hives and lumps and bumps to shingles, lupus-like disorders and cancers.

Diabetes | KDH offers a diabetes education, prevention and support program including group education and personalized support during individual counselling sessions. Delivered by a multidisciplinary team, the program offers virtual and in-person appointments. Diagnostic Imaging | KDH offers a variety of diagnostic imaging services: X-ray, ultrasound, mammogram, bone mineral density testing, electrocardiogram, Holter monitoring, pacemaker check, echocardiogram, and cardiac stress testing. Patients can self-refer for mammograms (call 613.258.6133 ext. 103) and bone mineral density testing (613.258.6133 ext. 400).

General Surgery | Focusing on the organs of the abdomen, the thyroid gland, diseases involving the skin, breast, soft tissue and hernias.

Gynecology <NEW!> | Dr. Tammy LeRiche provides a gynecology clinic for patients from the local community as well as those undergoing gynecology surgery at KDH. Services provided/conditions treated include contraception, fibroids, polyps, dysfunctional bleeding/ menstrual irregularities, post-menopausal bleeding, and ovarian/adnexal masses.

Internal Medicine | Prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of adult diseases including cardiovascular disease, hypertension, uncontrolled diabetes mellitus, thyroid disease. and gastrointestinal disease.

Lung Health Program | KDH hosts a Registered Respiratory Therapist/Certified Respiratory Educator in collaboration with ConnectWell Community Health. Neurology | Focusing on dementia, Alzheimer's, Multiple Sclerosis, TIA/stroke, migraines, brain tumors and treatment, Lou Gehrig's Disease, and spinal (disc) issues.

Orthopaedics | Treating bone, ligament and muscle conditions, including joint pain, providing pre-operative assessments, fracture follow-up and cast care.

Physiatry (Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation) | Treating patients with mobility issues, foot/back/neck/shoulder/hip/knee pain, sciatica, post-concussive syndrome, complications of stroke, complications of neuropathy, osteoarthritis, general extremity complaints, and non-traumatic spinal cord injuries.

Outpatient Physiotherapy | KDH offers bundled care funded physiotherapy after hip and knee replacement surgery. The hospital where your surgery takes place will send a referral to KDH to arrange your physiotherapy. A KDH Physiotherapist supports our Pulmonary Rehab Program in partnership with ConnectWell Community Health.

Plastic Surgery | Reconstructive or reparative surgery, specializing in malignant skin lesions and hand problems in both children and adults. Procedures performed include carpal tunnel repairs.

Pulmonary Rehab Program | In partnership with ConnectWell Community Health, KDH offers a Pulmonary Rehab Program for people with chronic lung conditions. The program is provided by a Respiratory Therapist/Certified Respiratory Educator and Physiotherapist. To register or for more information, call 613.259.2182 ext. 2324.

Sports Medicine | Injury diagnosis, management and prevention, from children to seniors, focusing on joint issues, ganglion, feet issues, and chronic back injuries.

Transfusion Clinic | Providing a variety of blood-related therapies including phlebotomy, platelet and blood transfusions, immunoglobulin G (IgG) and iron.

Telemedicine At KDH we have the capacity to offer telemedicine services so patients do not have to drive a long distance to see a specialist. If you are referred to a specialist whose office is a long way from your home, you may be able to see your specialist in subsequent visits through telemedicine at a centre close to your home. With telemedicine at KDH you can see and speak with your specialist via a TV screen in a private space.

WAY – Wellness Access for Youth – making a difference for North Grenville Youth

WAY - Wellness Access for Youth - is a collaborative made up of organizations that provide, refer, and support mental health and substance use health services for youth aged 12 to 25 years of age in North Grenville.

AY can help with mental health, substance use health, food insecurity, housing, employment, transportation to appointments, and more. WAY can also connect parents and caregivers to help through PLEO – Parents' Lifelines of Eastern Ontario. Dan MacKinnon (pictured at right) of Connect Youth is the WAY Coordinator and Navigator; it is his job to connect WAY clients with the help they need. With the new school year underway, Dan is prepared for an increase in calls.

"The start of the school year can be stressful as we leave behind summer days for the more structured school days," he said. "As well, September can bring huge transitions, from starting kindergarten to transitioning to university or college."

"Anxious feelings are normal and expected during times of transition or change," said Lorena Crosbie, Executive Director of Children's Mental Health of Leeds and Grenville, one of the WAY partners. "This is



especially true for children and teens going back to school, or for youth transitioning into a high school for grade 7," she added. "The transition can be stressful and disruptive for the entire family. That's why we want to spread the message that help is just a call away."

Client Story —

Dan shared the following letter from the mother of a recent WAY client.

⁶⁶ After experiencing consecutive head traumas at the beginning of this year, our son developed some devastating mental symptoms. Unfortunately, we found many doors closed to us and were in a constant battle to get help. We felt voiceless and in constant fear that we were going to lose our son, and our family seemed to be falling apart. Everything changed when the OPP put a call out to WAY.

Due to our unique situation, we assumed that we would be facing another closed door. We couldn't have been more wrong. Suddenly we had this amazing supportive team working together to get our family the help and resources we needed. Our son was offered a safe place to recover and so much more.

Dan connected with our son daily, either a quick, "Hey buddy, how's everything going today?" or a deep conversation about his future, education possibilities, and so much more. Dan listened and showed our son that he is valuable; in response our son found his smile, then his laugh, and now he is planning for his future.

When we took our son to the emergency apartment, I was blown away at the effort made to make him feel safe and comfortable. The thrifted furniture was cozy and clean. There were kitchen essentials and even a fan. What I really want to emphasize, however, was something I actually never considered essential before: Dan ensures that everyone has new linens and towels. Seeing every dime being so thoughtfully spent to ensure that these kids feel valued and that someone cares about them still makes me emotional. It may seem insignificant, but the impact was huge, not only on our son, but also on us as terrified parents leaving their scared child. Dan offered a sense of home when life was in chaos.

We know without a doubt that WAY and Dan saved our son's

KDH Auxiliary makes \$60,000 donation to enhance hospital services

The Kemptville District Hospital Auxiliary presented its annual donation to the Hospital in the lead-up to National Volunteer Week, April 16-22, 2023. The 2023 donation – in the amount of \$60,000 – was used to support the purchase of three new patient beds and a mobile nursing station for the inpatient medical unit, as well as a cardiac monitor for the recovery room. André succeeds Linda Carnegie, who served as Auxiliary President from 2020 to 2023, through the enormous challenges imposed by COVID-19. During Linda's tenure, the Auxiliary made the difficult decision to cancel Hey Day, its major annual fundraiser, in both 2020 and 2021, pivoting in 2021 to successfully take Hey Day 50/50 ticket sales online, a huge learning curve for the team. In 2021, the Auxiliary donated \$40,000 to KDH, an amazing accomplishment considering the entire KDH volunteer program was put on hold in March 2020 for the safety



of the volunteers. This included the shuttering of the Auxiliary café and gift shop, a major source of revenue. To continue supporting KDH financially during this time, Linda led community fundraising drives in 2020 and 2021 with point-of-sale donations at two local grocery stores.

A significant fundraiser that Linda coordinated in 2022 was the innovative 'British Tea' held over several days in conjunction with the Quilt Exhibition and the International Plowing Match in August of

that year. Most recently, she co-convened Hey Day 2023, a landslide financial and attendance success.

During her term as Auxiliary President, Linda also touched the lives of others with her own generosity and creativity. She made and delivered a hot lunch for KDH staff in November 2020 and again in June 2021. When KDH went live with its new Epic Health Information System in November 2022, Linda brought in a delicious meal for staff working through the night on the launch. She also made handmade lap quilts for residents in the Interim Long-Term Care Unit that year.
